The Directors of the Corporation take pleasure in being able to announce that important changes have been made in several directions which will prove of interest to all the members and be of decided benefit to the Club generally. Among the important things ... the funds for cancelling all its indebtedness and a new lease for a long term of years.

The property situated on the Musquash River in the counties of St. John and Kings, in the Province of New Brunswick, D.C., contains 35,000 acres of land with twenty lakes, and connecting streams. These lakes ranging from one-half to nine miles in length, are well stocked with land locked Salmon, Brook Trout, Sea Salmon fry put in June, 1889, and can be reached from Boston via Boston and Maine Railway, two trains per day, also via International E. S. C???? of Steamers three times a week. (See timetables). Guests can leave camp in the morning and arrive in Boston the same evening, also there is a fast down train, leaving Boston at 8 a.m. and arriving at Westfield at 10 in the evening, so that an early start could be made for camp the following morning,

if desired. It takes about three hours to reach camp from Westfield on New Brunswick Railway, and the same time from Musquash station on Grand Southern Railway.

The property contains the following buildings, Main Club House 26x30, two stories, Cook House annexed, 12x16, Guide House 16x22, Rustic Camp No 1, 12x16, ditto No 2, 15x20, Hatching House 18x24, and wood shed, etc., situated midway on the shore of Loch Alva or Big Lake.

On the shore of Labrador Lake are camps, Labrador No 1, 16x20, and No 2, 18x24, the latter of which is in process of construction. Twenty boats have been placed on the property, and more will be added as required. Good comfortable lumber camps are situated at different points which the proprietors kindly allow the members of the club to use as desired. The forests furnish all the game usually found in Maine or New Brunswick! The open season for shooting begins on Sept 20th and closes first of following January. The close season for Deer, made three years ago, expires Sept 1st '91. The Deer are coming in rapidly, having often been seen the past season and their signs are plenty. A pair of Moose were tracked near the Club House the past winter.

Nearly all the improvements required have been completed. The road leading from the Station at Westfield to the head of the lake has been put in order, so that passengers can be comfortably conveyed by a buck-board. A good substantial dam has been built on the Hasty Brook. The Hatching House has been in operation for two seasons, having a hatching capacity of 1,000,000 eggs, of which enough have been hatched during the past two seasons to test the feasibility of the enterprise. The land – locked Salmon, Brook Trout and English Brown Trout, were hatched with a loss of less than 2% this Spring. We have nearly 25,000 of the English Brown Trout in the troughs which are a great acquisition, as they like the fly readily, are gamey as the land-locked Salmon, excellent for the table and when grown, their average weight is from 6 to 8 lbs.

On the 11th of June, 1889, 40,000 young Sea Salmon were turned into the waters from the Government Hatchery at Grand Falls, N.B. Thus it will be seen that a good start has been made in the way of stocking the preserve, and with facilities now at hand for increasing the out-put of young fish yearly, with ordinary success, the waters will become thoroughly stocked.

The annual Stockholders' Meeting is held at the Club House on the third Wednesday in June, the height of the fishing season. Members desiring to visit the preserve will please confer with the House Committee two weeks before the date they intend going in.

Application can be made to the Treasurer, Henry O. Cutter, 5 Tremont Street, Boston, Mass., for stock which will be sold at \$50 per share. A bridge has been built on the Musquash River and parties can now ride over a good road from Musquash to the foot of Big Lake.
